### Think Visegrad publications

"Regional coalition building regarding the MFF post 2021" by Mr. Andrzej Sadecki (OSW)

Andrzej Sadecki conducted an analysis of the Multiannual Financial Framework for the years 2021-2027, taking into account the possible impacts of Brexit on the discussions. Andrzej Sadecki provides recommendations for the negotiations mainly for the Central European states.

"The labor market reform in the EU and the implications for Central Europe" by Ms. Alena Kudzko (GLOBSEC)

Alena Kudzko published a policy brief concerning the ongoing labour market reforms in the EU and recommends steps to be taken for the CEE countries in order not to end on the economic and political periphery of Europe.

"<u>V4—China relations: a lost opportunity or a new start?</u>" by Mr. **Alexandr** Lagazzi (EUROPEUM)

Alexandr Lagazzi explores how China has been changing its centre of attention in the 16+1 platform from the V4 to the Western Balkans. While analysing the current relations between China and the V4, he points out what strategy the V4 could adopt in addressing this shift.

### Charting a new path for a reinforced and improved V4-France cooperation

EUROPEUM Institute for European Policy, Polish Institute of International Affairs (PISM, Center for Euroatlantic Integration and Democracy (CEID) and Comenius University in Bratislava, Slovakia launched a new project "Charting a new path for a reinforced and improved V4-France cooperation", supported by the International Visegrad Fund.

The objective of the project will be to support policy-makers in charting a course for the engagement of V4 countries with the new French government, especially concerning EU policies where common priorities can be found. These priorities are mainly the development of CSDP, the digital agenda, energy security, justice and home affairs, and social Europe. The project will also look at other issues where positions may be opposed, such as migration, in order to create a mapping of the future of relations.

- The Ukrainian-Russian war has prompted Bratislava, Prague and Budapest to take a new look at their eastern neighbourhood. Cooperation with Ukraine is gaining momentum, although relations with Russia are still the top priority for the Czech Republic, Slovakia and Hungary. Diplomatic contacts with Kyiv have been rekindled, and the Visegrad Group has intensified its political support for Ukraine within the EU. The big success in the relationship between the V4 countries and Ukraine has been their booming energy cooperation. However, the pro-Russian gestures made by some leading politicians from the Czech Republic, Slovakia and Hungary remain a challenge for relations between Bratislava, Budapest, Prague and Kyiv. Co-operation between Budapest and Kyiv is further complicated by the dispute over the Hungarian minority in Ukraine.

### Think Visegrad platform

Think Visegrad – V4 Think Tank Platform is a network for structured dialog on issues of strategic regional importance. The network analyses key issues for the Visegrad Group (V4), and provides recommendations to the governments of V4 countries, the annual presidencies of the group, and the International Visegrad Fund. Think Visegrad covers thematic priorities of V4 including V4's internal cohesion, EU institutions and politics, the Western Balkans, relations with Eastern Partnership countries, development assistance, migration, security, energy security, environmental protection, energy security etc.

The formation of the network of V4 think-tanks was one of the priorities of the Czech Presidency in the Visegrad Group of 2011–2012. This idea reflected the long-term interest and willingness of Central European think tanks to enhance their cooperation



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within the Visegrad Group and to deepen its cohesion. Think Visegrad was established in 2012 by eight V4 research centres and institutes, and is funded by the International Visegrad Fund.

The project brings together all the members of the Think Visegrad network, namely:
